MARBLE FALLS — As budget discussions heat up in the next few months over the \$3 million deficit faced by

School District, there are no off-limits topics — including putting the closure of Spicewood Elementary School on the table.

Closing the school, which

the Marble Falls Independent has never met its enrollment projections, could save MFISD as much as \$1 million, board President Martin McLean said this week.

> But he and interim Superintendent Jim Boyle

said they hope the situation never comes to that.

"It would sure cause a lot of problems, but it has to be on the table," McLean said. "In a time of need, you have to do what you have to do."

McLean said he doesn't want the school to close, but trustees have told the public the district has no "sacred cows" when it comes to balancing the budget, and they have to honor that pledge.

But Boyle said the district is still a far cry from the financial "dire straits" it

would take to trigger a shutdown of the campus, which opened in 2004 at a cost of \$5.48 million.

"Currently, our position is that it will be maintained as is," Boyle said. "The growth has not occurred. But we

### LCRA tells investors utility systems for sale

BURNET — The controversial sale of 32 water and wastewater systems by the Lower Colorado River Authority is open to private investors and any affected communities, officials said Friday.

That news came to light on the same day as a water

County, just a couple of days after several communities and agencies claiming the authority is moving too fast on the sale showed up at an LCRA meeting in Austin.

"The process to identify buyers for LCRA's water and wastewater systems and two of its raw water pumping systems has begun," stated a release issued by LCRA buyers should contact LCRA's financial consultant, BMO Capital Markets, to engage in the process."

Community leaders are anxious to know whether potential buyers plan to raise service rates for systems, as well as how they plan to maintain water quality, Klaeger said.

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### MFalls' credit rating falls slightly

MARBLE FALLS — The city's credit-rating score dropped slightly because of continuing financial problems and the uncertainty posed by homestead tax exemptions, according to a financial report.

In addition, negative financial factors in the wake of the disastrous 2007 flood also led the Marble Falls credit rating to slip a notch, according to a global rating agency.

However, the economic outlook for the city is stable, financial experts said.

Fitch Ratings (which has offices in Austin as well New York and London) recently dropped the Marble Falls credit rating from A-plus

"The downgrade to 'A' from 'A+' reflects the city's weakened financial position, following consecutive years of unbudgeted net deficits," said a report in the online version of Business Wire. "The city's flexibility is further constrained by recent approval of optional homestead exemptions, which led to a modest decline in taxable assessed value."

Mayor George Russell said he isn't worried.

"With all the issues the city has faced recently - especially since the 2007 flood — to be downgraded from A-plus to A shows the strength of the community and the faith Fitch has for our area," Russell said.

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### Report shows no racial profiling in Marble Falls, says police chief

MARBLE FALLS — An annual report required by law finds no evidence of racial profiling on the part of the Marble Falls Police Department, the chief told City Council this week.

"I am confident the reports show the Marble Falls Police Department does not and has

not exhibited racial profiling," Chief Mark Whitacre said Tuesday.

In other business during the Feb. 15 meeting, the council approved a moratorium on flashing business signs and discussed acquiring a bridge from Burnet County.

The chief released the MFPD "Annual Contact Report" for 2010 to council members during the meeting.

As required by state law, each Marble Falls patrol officer records the ethnicity of a driver during motor vehicle "contacts" or traffic stops, the chief said.

The records are compiled into an annual report to show how many stops police made per ethnicity or race during a year.

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
